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

## **Recipes from the Polynesian Cultural Center**

#### **Tropical Fruit Salsa: A refreshing summer treat**

#### **Ingredients**

2 C watermelon, seeded and cubed into small pieces

1 cup of fresh pineapple, <u>peeled and</u> <u>cubed into small pieces</u>

1 mango, <u>peeled and cubed into</u> <u>small pieces</u>

1 cucumber, seeded and cubed into small pieces

½ small red or sweet onion, finely diced

1 tablespoon hot pepper, such as serrano, jalapeno, etc., seeded and finely minced. Note: 2 tsp. red pepper flakes can be substituted.

Optional: Other produce can be added or used as substitution, such as chives for the onions, papaya, jicama, corn, etc.

1 tablespoon of <u>one</u> of the following herbs, freshly minced: dill, basil, cilantro or mint.

1/4 c lime juice

1/4 teaspoon black pepper, freshly ground

½ teaspoon sea salt (Optional) ½ teaspoon chili lime salt

1/3 cup shredded coconut



**Step 1:** Peel and cut the fresh fruits with a sharp knife and place in a colander. Add 1 tsp. of salt (which will help release any liquid in the produce) and mix gently by hand. Then place the colander into the sink to drain for 10 minutes. At the end of the 10 minutes, gently press the fruit (still in the colander as it sits in the sink) to express out the excess juices.

**Step 2:** Gently scoop the fruit into a glass bowl. Add the chopped onions and hot pepper.

**Step 3:** in order not to bruise the fruit, stir gently with your hands to mix the produce (this can be done by gently scooping with a bottom to top folding action

**Step 4:** Pour the lime evenly over the mixture. Add the salt, and hot pepper. Toss gently.

**Step 5:** Cover and refrigerate. Keep the salsa refrigerated in an airtight container until time to serve. As you are using fresh produce, it is best to use within the next few hours. When ready to serve, pour off any newly accumulated liquid, then sprinkle with a touch of shredded coconut and some chili lime salt. Serve with fresh tortilla chips, or served on top of grilled fish or chicken, or in a refreshing green salad with sliced avocados and fresh grilled or steamed fish and topped with a delicious Champagne Vinegarette

#### **Korean Shamanism**

The earliest form of religion practiced in Korea, reaching back to prehistoric times, is the belief that there is a world populated by ghosts. Shamanism's origins can be traced back to societies that existed at least 40,000 years ago. The shaman has held a variety of titles, including "magician, medicine man, psychopomp, mystic, and poet." (Eliade, 2004)

While shamanism is not the same as mediumship, it does involve certain aspects of spiritual communication that may be considered similar.

The shaman differs from other healers or priests in that they can enter trance states at will. The shaman's soul left their body while they were tranced and moved into the spiritual worlds, where they met both helpful and hindering spirits. The shaman frequently engaged in a life-or-death combat with bad spirits out to hurt humanity. The shaman offers healing on a variety of planes, including the psychic, spiritual, and physical.

The shaman employs a holistic approach to their job, considering not just the individual

but also how that individual interacts with both their inner and outer worlds. According to the shaman, the soul is the location of life breath, or the place where a person's essence resides. Since spiritual illness frequently results in bodily illness, the shaman's main concern is treating the illness of the soul. The loss, invasion, and possession of the soul are all aspects of mental illness.

Korean Shamanism, also known as *Muism or Sinism*, is a traditional folk religion that has been practiced in Korea for thousands of years. It

involves the worship of gods and spirits, as well as the use of various rituals and practices to communicate with them. One aspect of Korean Shamanism that is particularly important is the use of *saju*, which is a form of divination that involves the interpretation of a person's birthdate and time.

The Chinese "Four Pillars of Destiny" system, also known as "BaZi," is the basis for Saju, which translates to "four pillars" in Korean. Based on the year, month, day, and hour of birth, a person's fate and character are determined using this system. Chinese astrology's "Four Pillars of Destiny" are thought to be forecasts based on the five elements and the yin-yang theory. The tale of Fu Si, or Bok-hee in Korean, is thought to be where the I Ching ("I Ching") got its principle (Shin, 2018). As a result, he is regarded as one of China's oldest mythical monarchs (traditional dates range from 2800 to 2737 BC). He is also credited with discovering the eight mystical trigrams, which is a well-known notion for the Qing dynasty. In Korean Shamanism, saju is used to provide guidance and insight into a person's life, as well as to help them make important decisions.

According to Korean Shamanism, each person is born with a certain destiny that is determined by the alignment of the stars and planets at the time of their birth. This destiny can be influenced by the actions of the

person, as well as by the spirits and gods that are believed to be present in the world. Saju is used to interpret a person's destiny and to provide guidance on how to live their life in harmony with the natural world.

In addition to *saju*, Korean Shamanism also involves the use of various other spiritual practices, such as the performance of rituals and ceremonies to honor the gods and spirits. These rituals often involve the use of music, dance, and chanting, as well as the burning of incense and the offering of food and drink to the spirits.

Korean culture has a rich history of shamanism, which is based on the belief in the ability to communicate with spirits and ancestors. While shamanism is not the same as psychic abilities, it does involve certain aspects of spiritual communication that may be considered similar. In addition, there have been some individuals throughout Korean history who have been recognized for their ability to communicate with spirits or demonstrate other psychic abilities.

One example is Hong Gil-dong, a legendary figure from the Joseon Dynasty (1392-1910) who was said to possess supernatural abilities such as superhuman strength, agility, and clairvoyance. It is important to note, however, that claims of psychic abilities are often met with skepticism and criticism in Korea, as they are in many other cultures. While there may be individuals who are recognized for their abilities, the concept of psychic abilities is not widely accepted or integrated into Korean culture and religion in the same way as it is in some other cultures.

Korean Shamanism has been an important part of Korean culture for thousands of years, and it continues to be practiced today. While it has faced challenges and suppression at various points in history, it has remained a vital part of Korean spirituality and identity. Today, many Koreans continue to seek the guidance and insight provided by *saju* and other shamanic practices, as a way of connecting with their cultural heritage and finding meaning and purpose in their lives.







Then cut the picture and tape it to the inside of the jar in the area where the clear window of glass is exposed.


And then cover the back of the picture with tape or vinyl covering.

#### **Hawaiian Spirituality**

Hawaii's spirituality is a part of the long-standing and vast Polynesian culture. It is based on the notion that the gods (*akua and kupua*), the natural spirits (*awaiku*), and the ancestral spirits (*awaiku*) have control over the elements of nature. The name for the spirit world is p (the underworld). Gods, demigods, and ancestral spirits live there. If a person's soul is not able to reach the underworld, it continues to exist as a spirit in the world of humans. These spirits could be friendly and supportive, aloof and rambling, or malicious and destructive. Many wandering spirits that are unable to access the underworld start their life in a stone.



Hawaiian Haka

Hawaiian spirituality views gods as divine creatures. In the early Hawaiian spiritual tradition, two Goddesses and four Gods were revered as Sacred Spirits or representations of the elements of nature. *Pele* was the Spirit of the fire and the volcano, whereas *Hina* was the Spirit of the Moon. The Creator Spirit, known as *Kne*, was referred to as "the leading Spirit among the Great Spirits." *K* was the warrior spirit. *Lono* was honored as the Spirit of Fertility and Peace. *Kanaloa* was the Ocean Spirit. These natural spirits were adored by the earliest Hawaiians, who believed they possessed both earthly and spiritual forms. The earthly forms were known as "many bodies" (*kino lau*). Hawaiians understood that the treasures of nature were gifts from the almighty.

In Hawaiian culture, the spirits have a big say in whether someone succeeds or fails in life. Success is the outcome of a guardian spirit's ability to protect. The tragedy and the poor luck are the work of evil spirits. Being receptive to messages that come in all shapes and from all sources is advised by the Hawaiian spiritual tradition. Spirits can communicate with one another through plants and animals. They can be detected by the smell of the bloom and the owl's hoot. Those who are adept at reading animal symbolism are always guided by the important signs from the spirit world.

Spirit possession in Hawaiian culture. The Hawaiians believe that spirits known as *Aqua Noho*, or "sitting gods," may communicate with and inhabit living things. The word for a person whose body a "sitting god" momentarily inhabits is "*haka*" (medium). During the spirit possession, the *haka* receives *mana* (spiritual power) and is revered as divine. A Hawaiian *kahuna* sorcerer can conjure or produce wish-fulfilling spirits, known as *Unihipili*, the dreadful spirits that magic can conjure. A procedure involving elements of black magic is used by the *kahuna* to turn the spirit of a recently sick child into a *Unihipili*, a terrible serving spirit. Thanks to its *mana* (spiritual power), this ghostly being grants its owner amazing supernatural skills.

However, keep in mind that the cultural and spiritual traditions of the people of Hawaii and the Pacific Islands have long included a variety of spiritual and psychic practices. For instance, the traditional divination practice known as 'Awaiku in Hawaiian culture includes flinging stones to reveal messages from spirits. Other Pacific Island societies also have their own distinctive spiritual practices and methods of divination. Folklore and ghost stories abound in the spiritual culture of Hawaii. On rare occasions, the spirits act as formidable allies and protectors. Sometimes they safeguard the general equilibrium of the natural environment, the water, the trees, and the environment. Hawaiian spirits have a reputation for being ominous and frightening, pushing people to grow spiritually and get over a defect.

The family's 'Aumakua, or holy guardian spirits. Each family is guarded by the 'Aumakua, guardian spirits, in Hawaiian mysticism. A variety of plants and animals might appear as guardian spirits. 'Awaiku is a traditional form of divination that is unique to Hawaiian culture. It involves casting small stones onto a special mat or surface and interpreting the patterns and shapes they make to communicate with the spiritual realm. In Hawaii, stones can either be regarded as sacred or unfortunate depending on whether they are the dwelling places of gods or evil spirits. The kahuna is revered in the polytheistic Hawaiian religion. The kahuna acts as a link between the material world and the afterlife.

They might be prophets, sorcerers, healers, or magicians.

The stones used in 'Awaiku are typically smooth and round, and they are often made from materials such as coral, lava rock, or river stones. The mat used for the casting process is known as a kapa, and it is made from woven fibers of the paper mulberry tree. To perform an 'Awaiku divination, the practitioner will typically sit or kneel before the kapa and concentrate on a specific question or issue that they would like to receive guidance on. They will then take a handful of stones and cast them onto the kapa, observing how they fall and the shapes that they create. Interpreting the stones and their patterns can vary depending on the practitioner and the specific situation, but generally, certain shapes and configurations are associated with specific meanings. For example, a circle or spiral pattern may represent the cyclical nature of life or the interconnectedness of all things, while a jagged or broken line may represent a period of struggle or challenge. Overall, 'Awaiku is a deeply spiritual practice that is rooted in the traditional beliefs and customs of Hawaiian culture. It is still practiced by some Hawaiians today to connect with their ancestors and seek guidance from the spiritual realm

In addition, there have been individuals from Hawaii who have gained recognition for their psychic abilities in more recent times, such as the late psychic and spiritual teacher Ram Dass, who spent many years in Hawaii and wrote extensively on spirituality and consciousness. However, note that these individuals were not necessarily associated with the Spiritualist movement or its practices.
